

education program - continues to flourish, thanks to grant funding from Washington STEM, the EPA Urban Waters Program, and the Department of Ecology! As part of a FieldSTEM Career Connected Learning Grant, TLC is working with students from North Central HS, Lewis & Clark HS, Central Valley HS, and University HS on a year-long Spokane River Watershed project. Students are participating in active, service-based field experiences focusing on water quality (e.g. measuring temperature, pH, dissolved oxygen, transparency, nitrates, and phosphates and sampling for macroinvertebrates); water quantity (e.g. measuring snow-water equivalency (SWE), SWE over time, and calculating available runoff in the Spokane River watershed); and urban water management (e.g. wastewater impact development). They'll wrap up the year by presenting individual research projects focusing on local water resources issues at a joint Youth Water Summit in May.

This October, we facilitated an intensive, Management to students at MEAD Alternative HS. Students measured plant



calculated soil media, created pervious pavement mixtures, designed and constructed a "modified" storm garden on their campus, and will do storm drain artwork/stenciling in the spring. We're presently teaching a year-long iteration of this curriculum to three chemistry classes at Post Falls HS. Resource Center, Upriver Dam, and the City of Spokane Urban Runoff Greenway Ecosystems (SURGE) project at Lincoln St. and W. Broadway Ave.

Students also got their hands dirty and feet wet during yet another successful TLC fall riparian restoration season! Approximately University HS, Central Valley HS, Post Falls HS, Liberty SD, Cheney MS, and MEAD Alternative HS planted several hundred trees and shrubs on Hangman Creek near the Hanging Tree Historical Monument and along the headwaters of Marshall Creek. Our spring restoration season begins in March, and we'll be holding a communitywide tree planting event on Earth Day—Saturday, April 22nd. Stay tuned for details!

TLC once again had the privilege to teach the Roots of Success environmental literacy cohort of roughly 25 offenders at the Geiger Corrections Center this fall. Two participants are continuing to take the course from us post-release. We're looking forward to teaching another cohort this winter.





### THOUGHTS FROM OUR **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR** BY MIKE PETERSEN

Welcome to 2017 and its challenges! Since January 17, there have been a slew of Executive Orders and Congressional Proposals to roll back environmental protection, sell off public lands, and reward energy corporations who are ignoring climate change. The Lands Council is taking action in a number of ways - and you can help as well. I encourage all of you to contact our elected officials to ensure they fight these measures.

Regardless of what happens in Washington DC, The Lands Council will continue to work with forest coalitions in Washington, Idaho, and Montana. Members include rural elected officials, staff from Congressional offices, timber people, and recreationists who are generally supportive of keeping public lands in public hands. Notably, a proposal to sell off public lands introduced by Rep. Chaffetz of Utah was withdrawn after an outcry from sportsmen and conservationists.

Working locally is key. Over the past couple of weeks I have met with County Commissioners from N. Idaho and NE Washington about forest issues. In addition to working together on forest health and wildfire issues, we are also having conversations about new Wilderness. We are not talking about selling off public lands. In our part of the country we

have communication and efforts happening between rural and urban stakeholders on resource issues! For example, legislation has been introduced by Senator Risch of Idaho to protect part of the Scotchman Peaks roadless area as Wilderness - with great local support!

Late last year a new group formed from a diverse set of people in Pend Oreille, Steven, and Ferry Counties to give input to the Colville National Forest. We have now met as a Tri-County group many times and are finding common ground. I sit on a Wilderness and recreation access committee, as well as, a grazing committee. It is exciting to be working with very diverse rural interests and talking about permanent protection for key roadless areas, and helping rural economies!

In North Idaho, all five northern counties are now participating with the Forest Service in collaborations. Again, the key was helping both the Forest Service and counties come together and work on tangible forest projects that helped with forest health and wildfire protection - all while meeting ecological standards. The Lands Council is now a member of the Shoshone-Benewah Forest Health Collaborative and the Panhandle Forest Collaborative

In NW Montana, our forest collaborative is working with a collaboratively challenged Forest Supervisor. We met with the Regional Forester and I think we are getting on the right track. I was invited to speak at the Western Governors Association meeting to speak about collaboration. I am thinking of collaboration as an antidote to confrontations like the Malheur Refuge takeover and the anti-public lands agenda of Reps. Bishop and Chaffetz of Utah.

Turning to our watershed work, we relocated our 100th beaver last year, mostly onto the Colville National Forest. Also, we are working to restore the Spokane River and three tributaries with tree planting, a couple of in-stream structures, outreach to landowners, and partnerships in several counties. We held a clean energy forum with another planned in the Spring, and are working to increase wild salmon in the Columbia River basin.

There are many opportunities to volunteer with our restoration efforts, both in the Spokane area, as well as the high peaks of Northeast Washington. Please let us know what you want
